



Letter from the Board President

July 1, 2012

For over 30 years, Housing Resources of Western Colorado has helped individuals and families in and around Mesa County achieve their goals for self-sufficiency.

Initially, as the Energy Office, we focused on making solar and other sustainable technologies available to homeowners to enable them to reduce their dependence on fossil fuels. This evolved into improving and repairing building systems through our Weatherization program, which provides free home upgrades to qualified residents to improve energy efficiency, and through our Rehabilitation program, which provides low-interest loans for more extensive projects. When the

opportunity came, we began offering our Self Help program, developing new subdivisions in which people help build their own homes, thereby creating sweat equity and a sense of community at a fraction of the market rate. Along the way, we have also purchased a handful of rental properties, which enable us to provide affordable apartments to those who do not yet qualify for home ownership.

Each of these programs profoundly helps those in Western Colorado with low- and moderate-incomes towards being self-sufficient. Because of our excellent administration, compassion, and integrity in delivering these programs, we have become one of the most respected 501 (c) 3 non-profit organizations in Mesa County. But we are not resting on our laurels. We understand that, in the current economic and political climate, some of these programs may not continue to be available forever, so we are working hard to preserve these programs, to supplement them with other programs that fit our mission, and to find non-governmental support for the critical and effective services that we provide.

As you will see in this Annual Report, we remain a financially-strong, talented, diverse, well-managed, adaptable organization, ready to meet the new challenges that lie ahead. We hope you will support us as we leverage these assets to continue and expand our programs and our mission.
